The gentry were the wealthy top 5% at the top of Virginia's stratified society. Some were "Cavaliers," supporters of King Charles I who had moved to Virginia during the English Civil War. Education was very important to the early Puritans, who felt it was a key part of Christian life. In fact, Harvard College was founded in 1636 by Puritans, primarily to educate the ministry. Children were required by law to attend school. "Dame Schools" were created for children ages six to eight, where the teacher usually taught reading.
