Vygotsky's Social Development Theory is the work of Russian psychologist Lev Vygotsky (1896-1934) [1][2]. Vygotsky's work was largely unkown to the West until it was published in 1962. Vygotsky's theory is one of the foundations of constructivism.

Social learning theories help us to understand how people learn in social contexts (learn from each other) and informs us on how we, as teachers, construct active learning communities. Lev Vygotsky (1962), a Russian teacher and psychologist, first stated that we learn through our interactions and communications with others.

Vygotsky's Developmental Theory introduces the applications of the theory in the classroom. Contrasting Piaget and Vygotsky Piaget was highly critical of teacher-directed instruction believing that teachers who take control of the child's learning place the child into a passive role (Crain, 2005).

Vygotsky's theory was an attempt to explain consciousness as the end product of socialization. For example, in the learning of language, our first utterances with peers or adults are for the purpose of communication but once mastered they become internalized and allow "inner speech".

Lev Vygotsky focused on the important contributions that society makes to individual development in his sociocultural theory of cognitive development. Thus, this theory emphasizes the interaction between how people develop and their culture.Furthermore, Vygotsky's sociocultural theory of cognitive development also suggests that human learning is, to a large extent, a social process.

A major contribution of Vygotsky's sociocultural theory of cognitive development in children is the acknowledgement of the social component in both cognitive and psychosocial development. Due to Vygotsky's proffered ideas, research attention has been shifted from the individual onto larger interactional units such as parent and child, teacher and student, brother and sister, etc.

Vygotsky scaffolding is part of the education theory the zone of proximal development. The zone of proximal development states that each student, for each subject, has three levels of learning: things the student can accomplish on her own, things she can accomplish with help from someone else (the zone of proximal development) and things she can't accomplish no matter how much help she has.

Vygotsky's theory revolves around the idea that social interaction is central to learning. This means the assumption must be made that all societies are the same, which is incorrect. Vygotsky emphasized the concept of instructional scaffolding, which allows the learned to build connections based on social interactions.

Ch. 2, p. 47 Classroom Applications of Vygotsky's Theory Vygotsky's concept of the zone of proximal development is based on the idea that development is defined both by what a child can do independently and by what the child can do when assisted by an adult or more competent peer (Daniels, 1995; Wertsch, 1991).

Classroom Applications of Vygotsky's Theory

Vygotsky's Social Development Theory, or SDT, introduced two major principles: Cognitive development is limited up to a certain extent or within a certain range, at any given age of the individual; and; An individual's full cognitive development requires social interaction.
